Daisy Girl Scouts may not participate in non-council sponsored money-earning activities. Troop money earning may be done only by troops who have participated in the council-sponsored Fall Product and Cookie programs Money-earning activities are not permitted during the Fall Product or Cookie program dates.

Girl Scout Money Earning Activity Guidelines:

Girl Scout money earning activities should meet the following criteria:

- Be a valuable program activity for girls that will generate additional funds for a planned activity or event
- Be suited to ages and abilities of the girls and consistent with goals/principles of the Girl Scout program
- Be a girl activity planned, generated, produced, and performed by girls - with supervision from leaders

By planning and participating in money-earning projects, girls build real-world skills that benefit their groups, councils, communities, and most importantly, themselves. Here are the "five skills" girls learn:

- 1. Goal setting
- 2. **Decision** making
- Money management 3.
- People skills 4.
- 5. **Business ethics**

Do's:

- Decide as a group how to use money earned by the group—individuals cannot earn money for individual use.
- Make sure an adult is present at all times during money-earning activities outside the meeting place.

Don't:

- Do any money-earning project without approval from your council.
- Participate in games of chance, direct solicitation for cash, or product endorsement.
- Raise money for other organizations or causes. (Girls can decide to donate as a group from their earnings or give service to that organization.)
- Hold "Girl Scout Night's" at local business where a percentage of sale from food or tickets is donated.

Ideas for Group Money-Earning

Get creative! Have fun building new skills and helping achieve goals for the group and community. Here are ideas to get girls started:

- Provide childcare at a special event
- Make handmade cards for occasions
- Pick up litter after sports events
- Have a themed car wash
- Do face-painting at a community event
- Wash neighborhood windows
- Walk pets
